



Canada Games 2019 Athlete Selection Criteria

PARTICIPANTS:

Competitors: 2 Males and 2 Females (one each in Compound and Recurve)

Staff: 1 Head Coach and 1 Team Manager; one of the team staff must be male, and one of the team staff must be female.

CLASSIFICATION:

No older than 20 years of age by December 31, 2019.

Year of Birth: Born in the calendar year 1999 or later.

COMPETITION at the Games:

The competition includes Qualification Rounds, followed by Individual Matchplay and Mixed Team Matchplay. The Qualification Rounds shall be the Indoor 18m Round (WA 4.5.2.1) followed by the Indoor Match Elimination and Finals Rounds (WA 4.5.2.4) and Mixed Team Elimination and Finals Rounds (WA 4.5.1.4 as modified by WA 4.5.2.4).

ARCHERY CANADA RULES Book 3 Target Archery for athlete equipment and competition practices and Book 2 Events for event organization and competitions will govern the event.

The Qualifying Round is 120 arrows: two 18-meter Rounds. The Qualification Rounds are shot on vertical triple for both compound and recurve. The new indoor target faces for Recurve and Compound may be used in this event. Difference between both faces: Recurve face has no longer the "Inner"-10 ring and the Compound face has no longer the "Recurve" 10 scoring zone. At the completion of the qualifying round all athletes and Mixed Teams are ranked based on cumulative score and selected or not for the Individual and/or Mixed Team Event(s).

ELIGIBILITY:

Competitors:

Excluded from the Canada Games are:

- Senior National Team athletes *;
- Athletes who do not meet the date of birth requirements
- Athletes that have held a Senior, SR1 or SR2 card (as defined by Sport Canada's Athlete Assistance program) at any time;
- Athletes who have previously competed for any nation at the following events:
 - o Olympic Games
 - o Senior World Archery Championship
 - o Pan American Games
 - o Commonwealth Games
 - o FISU Games

No athlete can be rendered ineligible within 90 days of the opening of the Games due to carding status or National Team status (i.e., no athlete will be excluded if they become National Senior Team members for the first time or are granted carding status after November 10th, 2018).

* Athletes who hold a C card (as defined by Sport Canada's Athlete Assistance program) or are in their first year of Senior National Team status may be deemed eligible on a case by case basis. Requests must be submitted to the respective Provincial/Territorial Chef de Mission and approved by the Canada Games Council's Sport Committee.

The Games are open to athletes who are members in good standing of their provincial and/or national sport organization. An athlete's permanent domicile or actual residence must be located, for at least the 180 days prior to the opening of the Games, within the recognized boundaries of the province or territory they are representing. An athlete can have only one domicile.

Students attending school on a full-time basis outside their province of permanent residence during the year of the Games shall be permitted to compete for either their province of permanent residence or the province in which the athlete attends school. To be eligible to compete for the province where the athlete attends school, the student must be enrolled on a full-time basis during the 2018-2019 academic year.

Exceptions to the domicile requirement will be possible if the athlete can demonstrate a commitment to the province or territory she or he wishes to represent by such means as having been a member of a club or provincial sport organization in that province for the entire previous competitive season, having represented that province or territory at a previous national or regional championship, or having attended school full-time the previous academic year, or a recognized national training centre full-time during the previous 12 months. Other similar circumstances may be considered.

An athlete is permitted to try out for only one province or territory per Games.

Team Nova Scotia Athlete Selection Process:

- 1) Be a member in good standing of Archery Nova Scotia and the ANS High Performance Program.

- 2) Be available to attend the dates of the Archery event which occurs either the first or second week of the CWG competition and abide by all rules of the Canada Winter Games and Staff
- 3) Athletes must participate in all ANS High Performance Program activities – training camps, workshops, fund raisers... Absent from any of these events must be approved by the head Coach and the Team Manager.
- 4) All athletes must submit scores from registered ANS target competitions, indoor and outdoor. Compound submit inner 10 scores, Recurve submit outer 10 scores. Do not score X's on the score card
- 5) The score cards must be appropriate for the event, properly filled out including 10's and 9 counts, signed by the athletes scoring in the group and signed by the judge of the event. The score cards are then submitted to Team Manager immediately after the event. Photos of the cards may be submitted electronically by email but the scores on the cards must match the lanes recorded scores or they will be ineligible. At least one of the scores submitted must be from one of the following registered events; ANS Indoor Championships, MICA, AC Regional Indoors or ANS Outdoor Championships. A venue may also request 30 days in advance to have a registered event qualify as one of the required events
- 6) Each athlete must submit at least three scores from registered competitions in the category they are trying out for. All three of these scores must meet the minimum required scores set for a Junior in the athlete's division in the ANS High Performance Selection Criteria. The average arrow score of the best 3 competition scores submitted (one of which will be from a required event), will be used to determine overall ranking.
- 7) Following the cut off date of September 30, 2018, the top 4 athletes of each category will be invited to a location(s) to be determined by two competitions with match play in October of 2018. An alternate team member for each category will also be selected. Each athlete will be awarded points during the two competitions that will combined for a final score. The top ranked individual at the end of the two competitions from each category will be named to the team.

Scoring System:

Each athlete will be awarded points corresponding with their ranking after the qualification rounds of each competition.

First Place = 4 points

Second Place = 3 points

Third Place = 2 points

Fourth Place = 1 point

Each athlete will be awarded for their matchplay during each competition.

A win is 2 points.

A tie that is lost by shootout is 1 point.

A loss is 0 points.

Tie Breaker rules

In the Case of a Tie for selecting the TOP 4 athletes for the final selection event:

Follows WA rules for tiebreakers 14.4.1 Indoors. All score cards submitted must include a tally of the 10's and 9's and ties will be broken by the greatest number of 10's followed by greatest number of 9's.

In the Case of a Tie for selecting the TOP athlete for Team Nova Scotia:

Follows WA rules for tiebreakers 14.4.2. Single-arrow shoot-off format.

Team Nova Scotia to be announced no later than November 1, 2018 leaving nearly 14 weeks to prepare the team
